PREFACE

This edition is a much enlarged and updated version of the bibliography that M. Aydın and M. N. Alkan compiled for the Center for Strategic Research in 1997. The previous effort, *An Extensive Bibliography of Studies in English, German and French on Turkish Foreign Policy (1923-1997)*, has served for an important need in Turkish studies, and has received commendations as well as frequent requests to keep it up to date.

Although not entirely comprehensive, this bibliography, covering 4056 titles, contains within its pages almost all the noteworthy books and articles on the subject written in English, German and French, the most commonly used languages in academic circles. Conceding the fact that it is virtually impossible to obtain bibliographical references for all the sources produced in these languages worldwide, there may be some works that have been included. We hope, however, in its present form the material covered within will again serve as an invaluable aid to all, from seasoned researchers to novice students alike.

Those titles not appearing within may be material for further squeals to this bibliography. In this respect, we urge scholars who find this publication lacking in any sense or who have information regarding missing titles to contact us by e-mail at aydin@politics.ankara.edu.tr.

Preparing a bibliography is a long, difficult, and thankless process.
